

Things to Know Before the Interview

1. The tape-recorded interview is approximately 45 minutes long.
2. You are asked to bring ONE quilt or quilted item that is significant to you and preferably also made by you. We call this your “touchstone object.”
3. You will be asked to fill out and sign the following:
 - A permission/release form
 - A participant and quilt information form that includes the date your quilt was made, title, where it was made, and dimensions
 - A “Quick Question” form
4. You will be photographed with your quilt after the interview, and the photograph will be posted along with your interview. A detail shot of your quilt also will be taken.
5. A sampling of the interview questions is available in the Manual.

During the Interview

1. Your interviewer will make a brief announcement before the interview begins.
2. The main goal of your interviewer is to elicit information from you that allows us to see the world through your eyes, so your interviewer should do very little talking.
3. Relax and talk as much as you want. More is better!
4. You may or may not have a scribe during your interview. The scribe's job is simply to take notes to make the transcription process easier. The scribe may ask you to clarify some things after the interview.
5. Your interviewer will make a brief closing announcement at the end of the interview.

The Transcription Process

1. The tape of your interview is copied and mailed to a transcriber.
2. Transcribing an interview can take anywhere from 6-10 hours, depending on the skill of the transcriber and the quality of the tape.
3. However, because most of our transcribers are busy volunteers, it will take time for your tape to be transcribed and sent to you for editing. We do our best to get it to you quickly.

When the Transcription is Complete

1. Two copies of the transcription (one for your records and the other to return) and a final permission letter will be mailed to you. At your request, we also can send you a copy electronically.
2. We ask that you review and return your corrected transcription as soon as you can.
3. If you will be delayed, please let your contact person know.
4. Please do not rewrite your interview. Check the transcript for factual accuracy - fill in missing information like last names, correct spellings, etc.
5. After the corrected transcription and final permission letter are sent to Karen Musgrave, she will check the transcript one more time for correct formatting before posting it to the website.
6. Once your interview is posted, you will be notified by e-mail, postcard, or telephone.
7. Finally, all your interview materials will be archived at the American Folklife Center at the Library of Congress.
